Welcome and Budget Update: Still no capital budget passed.

Suitability Field Trip Comments: Camp Lake, 29 Pines, Dickey Creek swimming hole

- Interesting conversation at Camp Lake where the creek has incised and moving the road could impact owls, but would allow for restoration of the creek.
- Camp Lake/Rye Creek area that's undercutting affects snowmobilers.
- A few vehicles on the road caused it to become very powdery and dusty.
- The Dickey Creek swimming hole is great, but it's there because of massive erosion upstream.
- Sanitation is an issue, parking is an issue.
- 29 Pines Campground is in the floodplain consider relocating parts of the campground and include a reservation only section for educational events.
- You can limit recreation by leaving things status quo/small.

USFS Multi-Use Trails Field Trip Comments: West Fork crossing, West Fork Trail, Yellow Hill Trail, Middle Fork Trail.

- Navigational signage would be great.
- There is varied use intensity, uses between trails. Learned about the technical difficulty of the trails as well as the placement of the Middle Fork Trail.
- The trails were designated motorized, but are being used by all single track users. There is an opportunity for a connector to towns and other trails.
- There were discussions about the 4305 road being used as a connector. The Nature Conservancy (TNC) will not be allowing any other motorized use on TNC managed lands, except winter grooming for snowmobiles.
- Learned about recreational dams and consequences of recreational dams.
- Conditions of the trails were better than expected.
- The Middle Fork Trail is poorly placed on the valley floor, as the river is dynamic.
- Conversation about forest ecology wildfires, woody debris, suitable spawning areas.
