




What activities do you currently participate in in the TCF?






In your opinion, what should be the planning priorities for the TCF?

What resources/amenities would you look for to visit/ride the Teanaway?






Which users do you believe should have access to the Forest?






Do you support the idea of creating recreational "priority zones" within the valley in an effort to separate some uses and enable more user-specific trail designs?





What riding style do you think fits best within the Teanaway?:










What is the minimum number of <u>mountain bike trail</u> miles you believe would make the TCF an attractive riding destination?








Would you camp in the Teanaway CF as part of your riding adventure? If yes, how many nights on average?

Answered: 240 Skipped: 4



General Advice Comments: 68 Respondents Include wildfire planning considerations.

Provide easy access to trails with ample parking. Address any trails that currently cross private property.

Better signs for horses in campgrounds.

Limit fees to keep things equitable.

Be respectful of local desires.

There are no other early snow-free riding/hiking options like this on east side of mountains to go riding There is not enough traffic if any one specific sport to necessitate single use

Mountain bikers are good stewards, they care, they spend money in nearby communities. Consider this in planning. We have so many "flat" runway trails for beginner/intermediate riders and up, but we are lacking in expert/advanced

technically challenging trails.

If trails are thoughtfully planned, motorized and mt bikers/hikers can get along.

Capital Forest is a great example where each user group gets a slice of the pie. Try to emulate that.

ORV/motorcycles also should not then be allowed on sensitive trails when they get too dusty/dry and are more prone to erosion and, potentially, wildfire. (i.e. No ORV use in August and Sept.)

Kititas Chapter: Teanaway Trail Planning Meeting Outcomes – March 13

- Connect the trail network to itself, to towns, and to USFS trails
- Create more trail continuity. Less intersections = less people lost
- Use junction signage similar to Bend, OR
- Bike packing options
- Shared use where appropriate: 2 way XC in phase 1, Directional DH lines in phase 2
- Advanced descent trails will engage regional riders in doing maintenance greater
- Stacked loop options of varying distances leaving from campgrounds, and connect the three campgrounds via trails
