G. ADJOURNMENT

CALL TO ORDER

2 The Chair of the Committee Sara Palmer called the meeting to order at 10:01am. All of the Committee members introduced themselves.

PUBLIC COMMENT FOR KILISUT PASSAGE

Before hearing public comment, Chair Sara Palmer announced that the Committee had received a
 letter from the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe concerning the Kilisut Passage name proposal at the
 start of this meeting.

Janet Welch, the proponent, asked Sara to read the letter to the Committee saying that the letter might help resolve this issue.

Sara read a letter submitted to the Committee by Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe stating the Tribe's opposition to the proposed name of Kilisut Passage and wishing for a Tribe-approved variation of the S'Klallam place name for the site.

Janet said that she had been in contact with David Brownell, and had been told that the Tribes would be submitting an anglicized version of the place name. Janet said that while it sounds like a name has been proposed, because it is hard to pronounce it does not sound anglicized.

Janet said that her concern is that there is local reference and global mapping. Janet said that she refers to the feature as The Passage, and historically it makes sense that people locally would refer to it as The Passage. Janet said that putting it on global mapping essentially translated as The Passage doesn't really do anybody any service.

Janet said she wrote to David when he commented on Indian Island, and said that maybe David should back up and name Indian Island with an anglicized version of the name that David presented. Janet proposed to David to name the feature Kilisut Passage with full S'Klallam translation underneath the name. Janet said that naming a feature "Passage" regardless of language is not very descriptive. Janet said that while it may be historically appropriate and used by local people, it's not going to be a local name but a global name.

Janet said the she is very impressed by the qualifications and backgrounds of the Committee members, and just wants to see the naming process carried through for this feature. Janet said that she is open to what the feature is called, but just didn't want to see the naming languish like it has for the past years.

KILISUT PASSAGE: FINAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

Chair Sara Palmer asked if there was discussion among the Committee. Dr. Grant Smith said that he felt Janet Welch's comments were very persuasive and he was convinced to do something with this feature other than what is currently before the Committee.

- Mike Iyall said that the Committee must avoid any sense of urgency and that there is no rush to get it wrong. Mike said that jargon was no one Tribe's language but a mixture of many languages
- 45 and varied with location. Mike said that the Committee should defer this proposal to allow
- 46 Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe to submit a proposal and that there is no rush.

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Dr. Grant Smith said he agreed, and was in no rush to get it wrong as well. Dr. Smith said jargon was a way for people to get along, and was important to Washington's history. Dr. Smith said that he wishes to defer the proposal as well.

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Dean Foster asked the Committee to defer this proposal to allow other possible proposals to catch up in the process. Dr. Allyson Brooks said that she agrees, and this proposal should be tabled until the next meeting to allow other proposals to come forward.

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Mary Schaff said that her only concern is that if the Committee tables this proposal, another proposal might not be submitted to the Committee. Mary said that she has only seen comments in opposition to the current proposal, and wondered if tabling it would lead to it on the agenda indefinitely.

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15 Chair Sara Palmer said that she was aware of a possible proposal from the Jamestown S'Klallam 16 Tribe, but Committee staff has been unable to reach the proponent. Sara said that she understood 17 though, due to short staffing and other issues the Tribes are dealing with. Sara said that Committee 18 staff would follow up with the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe.

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Mike Iyall said the he urges people to remember that this area's ancient history is not European history, it is Native history. Mike said that if we want to maintain our connection to the past, we must remember our Native history. Mike said that there is no rush, and the Committee should get it right the first time.

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25 MOTION: Dean Foster moved to defer the name Kilisut Passage.

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27 SECOND: Dr. Grant Smith seconded the motion.

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ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to defer Kilisut Passage until the next Committee meeting.

Mary Schaff commented that she appreciates correcting spelling errors, especially in the case where it makes the name more unique.

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Dean Foster said the he did not receive the materials for the meeting, and asked staff to get the materials for the meeting in advance next time. Mike Iyall asked how big the feature was, Chair Sara Palmer told Mike that the feature was 7.1 acres.

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43 Mike then made a motion to approve the name.

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45 MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Rizeor Lake.

1 SECOND: Mary Schaff seconded the motion.

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9 KLOKE PEAK: FINAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

- 10 Mike Iyall said that there is nothing wrong with naming features using contemporary names when
- they are not in conflict with traditional names, and that he supports this proposal.

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- 13 Dr. Grant Smith said that while he has expressed concerns in the past with commemorative
- 14 naming, he could go along with this proposal due to public support and the relationship with the
- 15 feature and the person being commemorated.

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17 MOTION: Mary Schaff moved to approve the name Kloke Peak.

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19 SECOND: Dr. Allyson Brooks seconded the motion.

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- 21 ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to send Kloke Peak to the Board on Geographic
- Names with the Committee's recommendation to approve.

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PUBLIC COMMENT FOR KIRKSON CREEK

25 None

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KIRKSON CREEK: FINAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

- 28 After an overview of the proposal from Chair Sara Palmer, Mary Schaff asked staff why the
- 29 proposal was still on the agenda after last meeting. Staff said that the proposal was deferred at the
- 30 last Committee meeting to allow the proponent to submit more evidence of local support for the
- 31 proposed name. Staff said they contacted the proponent, but no additional materials were
- 32 submitted.

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- 34 Mary said that her objection to this proposal at that last meeting was because the proposal was
- 35 confusing, as it was a combination of two last names and might lead someone to research the name
- not knowing it was a combination. Mary said that she was not supportive of the proposal.

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- 38 Dr. Allyson Brooks said she agreed with Mary about the proposal being confusing due to not
- 39 commemorating one particular person.

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41 MOTION: Dean Foster moved to deny the name Kirkson Creek.

SECOND: Dr. Allyson Brooks seconded the motion.

- During discussion of the motion, Mary Schaff said because Putnam Barber was absent, she felt it
- 46 correct to honor Putnam by saying the proponent is welcome to put a sign in their yard with the

1 name.

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Mike Iyall said that because the proponent did not supply additional material to the Committee, heviews the proposal as incomplete.

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7 8 ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to deny the name Kirkson Creek.

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PUBLIC COMMENT FOR REEDS BAY

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REEDS BAY: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

After an overview of the proposal from Chair Sara Palmer, Mike Iyall made a motion to approve the proposed name.

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15 MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Reeds Bay.

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17 SECOND: Dean Foster seconded the motion.

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19 ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Reeds Bay for Final Consideration.

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COMMITTEE DISCUSSION FOR SQ__ REPLACEMENT NAMES

- 23 Mary Schaff said things may have changed in light of the Secretarial Order but last time the
- 24 Committee faced competing proposals from Tribes for the same feature, the Commissioner of
- 25 Public Lands told the Committee to not make a decision. Mary said that last time the competing
- 26 names were sent back to the Tribes for mediation. Mary said she is concerned, and wants to make
- 27 sure the Committee's process is rock solid before going forward. Mary said that because of who
- she is, she is not comfortable making this decision when two Tribal names are competing for the

29 same feature

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- 31 Chair Sara Palmer agreed and said that while she has not spoken directly to the Commissioner of
- 32 Public Lands, she recommends to the Committee to table the competing Tribal names and ask that
- 33 the Tribes have further conversation among themselves.

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- Dr. Allyson Brooks said that the Committee should reach out to the Tribal Chairs and say that the state is not in a position to decide, and ask if it was possible for the Tribes to agree on one name.
- Dr. Brooks used the example of her work, where the Tribes are always able to make a decision amongst themselves when human remains are found.

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Mike Iyall said he agreed completely, and the Committee should refer proposals back to the Tribes when names are contested. Mike said that the Tribes should decide the issue.

- 43 Dean Foster thanked the Tribes for submitting the names, and said his concern was if non-Tribal
- 44 residents are aware of the possible name changes. Dean said that maybe because of the
- 45 Committee's two-step process, the word will get out and the Committee will get more comments.
- Dean said that he agrees with what Mike Iyall said earlier, and this is a big issue going around the

country and the Committee should get it right.

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Dr. Grant Smith said that the Committee should look to usefulness in a linguistic way and pronounceability when approving names. Dr. Smith said if he has to choose, he will vote for the name that is easy to pronounce, because the general public will want names approved that they will actually use. Dr. Smith said the public will object if the Committee approves names that are hard to use and pronounce.

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Dr. Smith said he supports sending the competing proposals back to the Tribes with the vague concept of usability. Dr. Smith said that in the past, the Tribes have been very helpful and understanding about that concept, and might not need the encouragement of the importance of pronounceability. Dr. Smith said that it is import for the Committee to educate the rest of the community about the nature of the feature, and way and which the feature is important to the indigenous community.

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Mike Iyall said the Committee's priority should be heritage first, and it is up to the Committee to allow that heritage the process to resolve itself. Mike said that if you look across North America, pronounceability has never been an issue. Mike said there are many examples of European names that are hard or impossible to pronounce, so pronounceability is not as big of an issue to him as heritage.

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25 26 Mary Schaff said that in in regards to a names usability, it is kind of like the "chicken and the egg" scenario. Mary said that people will not learn how to pronounce a name until it appears on a map. Mary said before the Committee goes further, she would like to thank all the Tribes and that this was the best Tribal response should could have envisioned when this process started. Mary said she is delighted to see active engagement from the Tribes, and wanted to thank the Tribes for the well thought out proposals.

PUBLIC COMMENT FOR WENAHA PEAK

Guy Moura, representing the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, spoke to the 3 Committee. Guy said the name was chosen because the feature is above the Wenaha River. Guy 5 said the name Wenaha is actually a Cayuse place name, but the peak is in the traditional territory of the Chief Joseph Band of Nez Perce. Guy said the name was chosen for consistency because 6 of the nearby river, and the name is easily pronounceable and is a traditional Native place name. 7

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WENAHA PEAK: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

After hearing from the proponent, Mike Iyall made a motion to approve. 10

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12 MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Wenaha Peak for Final Consideration.

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SECOND: Dr. Grant Smith seconded the motion.

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ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Wenaha Peak for Final 16 Consideration. 17

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PUBLIC COMMENT FOR TUCANNON SPRING

- Guy Moura, representing the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, spoke to the 20
- Committee. Guy said that the feature is in the traditional territory of the Chief Joseph Band of Nez 21
- Perce and is a distortion of an Indian word meaning bread root. Guy said everyone uses the word 22 tucannon today. 23

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TUCANNON SPRING: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

Mike Iyall thanked Guy Moura for participating today. Mike said that he is familiar with corrupted 26 words, as Toutle is a corrupted Cowlitz word. 27

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MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Tucannon Spring for Final Consideration.

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SECOND: Dr. Grant Smith seconded the motion. 31

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ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Tucannon Spring for Final 33 Consideration. 34

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PUBLIC COMMENT FOR NOSKELIIKUU

- Lia Frenchman, representing the Quinault Indian Nation, spoke to the Committee. Lia said the 37
- name means "where the whale was dropped", and might not be the exact place that the event 38
- happened but is a long standing oral history that has been passed down. Lia said that the actual 39

place where the event happened is nearby though, and given the current name of the feature, the Tribe feels this is an appropriate replacement.

Lia said that this event was a very important to the Quinault people, and has direct relation with stories of Thunder Bird helping the Quinault people. Lia said that the feature currently called Mount Olympus is where Thunder Bird resided, and all these names are connected.

NOSKELIIKUU: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

Chair Sara Palmer said that she had to make some phone calls to get some coaching on how to pronounce some of these names, but she thinks it's kind of fun if we can learn to say new things.

Mike Iyall thanked Lia Frenchman for sharing today. Mary Schaff said that the Committee should try to include the origin of the names in the materials if the names are approved. Mike said that it is important to recognize that the Tribal stories are the Tribe's intellectual property and if they wish to share that is wonderful but the Committee has to grant them the respect of asking if it is

16 appropriate to share.

18 Chair Sara Palmer said that going forward, the Committee is hoping that becomes part of the conversation. Sara said it would be an opportunity to educate people in Washington on our history.

Lia Frenchman said that there is discussion with adding an interpretive sign to the feature with the history. Lia said the Quinault Indian Nation does have some interpretive signs on some trails in the area.

- Dean Foster asked if the Committee had authority to change the name of a feature on Federal lands.

 Mike Iyall said that the Secretarial Order which brought these names forward gives the Committee
- 27 the right to change the names.

Dr. Allyson Brooks asked that even if the Washington Committee pushed these names forward, isn't there a Federal Board that decides the name of the features and that the Committee is only advisory? Mike said that due to the Secretarial Order the Committee should go forward, even if a Federal Board over rules the Committee. Mike said that the Committee represents the citizens of Washington.

Dr. Brooks agreed, but did not want to give anyone the impression that the Washington Committee had final say on Federal land. Mary Schaff said that the Committee does not have the final say on any geographic name, and Dr. Brooks agreed saying that the Washington Board on Natural Resources has the final say.

Mary Schaff said that the US Board usually is interested in the Washington's decisions, and goes along with them 90% of the time. Mike said that until Washington is over ruled, the Committee should make their stand. Mike said that is we defer these names; they may never come back.

Guy said that Condon Mountain is in the traditional territory of the Nespelem Tribe and is also a usual and accustomed place of the Kataro band of the Okanogan. Guy said that the Condon family is well known in the area, particularly in the Kartar Valley.
- MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Condon Mountain for Final Consideration.
- SECOND: Dean Foster seconded the motion.
- ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Condon Mountain for Final Consideration.

PUBLIC COMMENT FOR WEST FORK FROSTY CREEK

- Guy Moura, representing the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, spoke to the Committee. Guy said that the feature is located in the North Half of the Colville Reservation and is a tributary of Frosty Creek. Guy said that the name was chosen for consistency's sake.
- WEST FORK FROSTY CREEK: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item) Mike Iyall thanked the Colville people and made a motion to approve.
- MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name West Fork Frosty Creek for Final Consideration.

MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Shluxiksikswana for Final Consideration.

and Bands of the Yakama Nation and moved to approve the name.

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29 SECOND: Dr. Allyson Brooks seconded the motion.

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ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Shluxiksikswana for Final 32

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PUBLIC COMMENT FOR SNQÍLT CREEK

Guy Moura, representing the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, spoke to the

Committee. Guy said that the Colville had prepared a place name document for the upper 37 38

Columbia River and have around 500 named places.

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Guy said that this proposed name is not a specific place name, but an area place name. Guy said 40 the area is between the Little Dalles up to Northport, and this creek is in the middle of that area. 41

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SNQÍLT CREEK: INITIAL CONSIDERATION (Action Item)

Mike Iyall thanked Guy Moura and made a motion to approve. Guy Moura thanked the Committee 44

and said he appreciated their dedication to this issue. 45

MOTION: Mike Iyall moved to approve the name Snqilt Creek for Final Consideration. 1

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SECOND: Dean Foster seconded the motion.

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During discussion of the motion, Mary Schaff said that this proposal is interesting because in English one might not be supportive of a general place name being applied to a stream. Mary said she has no problem with the proposal as it stands, but in English one might call into question the idea of a generic being applied to a specific place. Mike Iyall said as a historian, if we look back in history a lot of the explorers and fur traders were incredibly generic when apply geographic names.

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Dr. Allyson Brooks said that when we use terms like English, it's important to remember that 12 Washington State has many languages that are used in our state. Dr. Brooks said even though we 13 talk about being predominantly English, we have a huge variety of languages and cultures. Dr. 14 Brooks said that it is good for people, especially in the United States, to learn how to pronounce 15 other languages. 16

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Guy Moura said that this proposal conforms to a common practice where a name for a specific area is also included in names for other features. Guy said that while it may not seem typical in American English, when you say things like New York it means a lot of different things to different people, some people may think of the state and others may think of the city.

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ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously to approve Sngilt Creek for Final Consideration.

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UPDATE ON SQ ISLAND IN CLARK COUNTY

Staff gave an update on the status of an island located in Clark County. The feature was an island that has now joined the mainland, but still appears in the Federal names database as an island. Staff said that the US Board on Geographic Names will not remove the name without a replacement name. Mary Schaff said that if an individual proposes a replacement name for the feature, that would be a good time to modify the identifier from "island" to something more appropriate.

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COMMITTEE BUSINESS

Chair Sara Palmer gave an update on some discussions she has had with the Governor's Office concerning derogatory names in Washington. Sara said that she is aware of a likely proposal to correct a derogatory name applied to a lake. Sara said that she also heard that the Yakama Nation may submit some proposals to correct some derogatory names on the Columbia River.

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Sara said she is glad these conversations are starting to happen, and that she has stressed to the Governor's Office and the Dept. of Natural Resources about the staffing limitations the Committee of Geographic Names has in dealing with some of these issues.

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Sara said she is aware of a Federal committee that may identify derogatory names in the Federal names database. Mary Schaff said she thinks the Dept. of the Interior is dealing with the sq names replacement first, and then moving onto derogatory names.

- 1 Mike Iyall said that this is a step towards growth, as the Committee evolves their process they are
- 2 becoming more inclusive and showing people that if they speak the Committee will listen.

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- 4 Dr. Allyson Brook said that the country is in a culture shift and we have to be cognizant, kind, and
- 5 aware that there are other languages than English that are being used nationally as well as in
- 6 Washington. Dr. Brooks said that she is not concerned about names that are hard to pronounce at
- 7 first, as people will learn to pronounce them as we always do.

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Dr. Grant Smith said that he would like to mention the distinction between derogatory and offensive. Dr. Smith said that the Committee has to be careful of politicization, and that the word derogatory means to belittle or hurt someone and the Committee has to remove those names.

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Dr. Smith said he sees examples of people objecting to things, and feel that anything objectionable should be changed. Dr. Smith said that he feels the definition for derogatory is that it can be proved that the term was used belittle someone else. Dr. Smith said the sq____ name replacements are an example of belittling and hurting people by using a word.

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Dr. Smith said that if the Committee was going to deal with any name that people feel is objectionable, he thinks that would allow people to object to anything. Dr. Smith said that in order for a name to be derogatory, it should be documented that it was used to hurt or denigrate somebody and then he is willing to take action, not simply because someone finds it offensive to them.

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Mike Iyall says that he feels this is in a room full of reasonable people, and if a majority feels one way the Committee will act correctly.

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Sara said she would keep the Committee posted as things develop and she enjoys the increased engagement over these issues.

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COGNA MEETING

- Mary Schaff reminded the Committee about the upcoming Council on Geographic Names
 Authority meeting coming up. Mary said that she hoped to see some of the Committee members
- attend, and said the COGNA meeting is an important opportunity for the state and Federal naming
- 34 authorities to connect.
