2 Chair Goldmark called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM. All board members introduced themselves. Chair Goldmark noted there is a quorum for this meeting, with Dean Mittelhammer 3 4 participating via conference call. 5 6 SAFETY REVIEW 7 Ms. Vansot gave a safety overview and instruction on evacuating the building in case of an 8 emergency for the audience and board members. 9 10 APPROVAL OF MINUTES Chair Goldmark called for approval of the minutes for the December 3, 2013 Regular Board of 11 12 Natural Resources Meeting. 13 14 MOTION: Commissioner Grose moved to approve the minutes from the December 3, 2013 15 meeting. 16 17 SECOND: Director DeLuca seconded the motion. 18 19 ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously. 20

3 4 5 6	TIMBER SALES (Action Item) Proposed Timber Sales for February 2014 3 Handouts, including the presentation Paul Bialkowsky, Product Sales & Leasing Division	
7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20	The results of the December auctions were presented to the board by Mr. Bialkowsky. The Department offered 9 sales totaling 27.4 mmbf in December. Of those offered, all 9 were sold totaling \$11.2 million, for an average of \$408/mbf.	
	Mr. Bialkowsky remarked that bidder interest remains high with some sales receiving 5 or 6 bids and an average of 3.7 bidders per sale. He noted that strengthening lumber and log prices are a result of continued export demand, and that the export market is providing a strong floor to log prices.	
	Commissioner Grose inquired about the asterisk on the sale results labeled "FSC". Mr. Bialkowsky explained that all department timber sales are certified under the Sustainable Forestry Initiative certification standard and sales in the South Puget Planning Area are also certified under the Forest Stewardship Council standard, and the asterisk denotes these sales.	
21 22 23 24	The proposed February sales were then presented to the board. The department proposes to offer 11 sales in February, totaling 51.0 mmbf. The appraised value of these sales is \$14.6 million, for an average of \$286/mbf.

She explained that the seller is Mid-24 Valley Resources, affiliated with the Hampton Corporation. The negotiated purchase price of \$2.19 million includes a requirement that the state be provided with \$26,000 towards remaining 25 26 RMAP obligations that could not be completed due to weather conditions. Ms. Sandberg stated 27 that the seller had worked diligently to complete nearly \$100,000 in RMAP work, and now is 28 contributing financially to the remaining work. She described the property characteristics of predominately Site Class II with most of the acreage at 0-30 years age class. There is a rock 29 30 resource on the property that will provide value to future region timber sales. She stated that this 31 acquisition contributes to the timber asset base, is adjacent to existing trust land, and provides a 32 rock resource. 33 34 Ms. Sandberg asked for approval of Resolution 1419. 35 36 MOTION: Commissioner Grose moved to approve Resolution 1419. 37 38 SECOND: Director DeLuca seconded the motion. 39 40 ACTION: The motion was approved unanimously. 41 42 CHAIR REPORTS (Action Item) | 1 Handout 43 State of the State Lands Report FY 2013

Kyle Blum, Deputy Supervisor for State Uplands

Mr. Blum provided the annual update on the state of the state lands, which include forest management, leasing program and transactions. He reviewed how the department invests in forest stands, shipping 5.7 million seedlings to regions for reforesting trust lands and 1.5 million seedlings sold to the public, valued at \$527k. It is worth noting that DNR did a lot of work experimenting with growing larger seedlings, and although work is already being done to grow larger seedlings, we are working at growing them even larger, giving them a robust more competitive start. Mr. Blum added that silviculture activities for FY 13 were funded. For PCT, we did a little more than 23,000 acres of pre-commercial thinning. That is double the decadal

average; a lot of which was Jobs Bill money with the management fund increase approved by the board. He added that site preparation acres were up, and as time goes on we are looking at seeing

site preparation continue to increase, and hopefully reduce vegetation management.

Director DeLuca asked about the nature of the site preparation and whether it is a mechanical site preparation or herbicide treatment. Mr. Blum specified that it is both, but was mostly herbicide treatment.

Mr. Blum shared that DNR has completed measurement of 10 genetics test sites that will guide the establishment of future seed orchard blocks. These sites are located across a wide range of environments, and help us identify seed sources that show stable performance across these environments.

Mr. Blum informed the board of the timber volume sold in FY13, detailing that sustainable harvest on State Trust Lands in Western Washington calculated and approved in 2004 and adjusted in 2007 to 5.5 billion board feet for the decade. He presented the Western Washington Sustainable Harvest Units from FY05-FY13 (9 years) sold sales and percent of projected sustainable harvest, noting that Skamania and OESF are under the ideal 90% level target and Clark and Cowlitz counties are above the target.

Commissioner Grose asked if we are doing anything to make up for both Skamania and Wahkiakum counties in FY14, and Mr. Blum stated that he will get back to the board regarding total projected targets.

Mr. Blum informed the board of the average stumpage value, stating that prices peaked in FY 2006 at the height of the housing bubble: \$370/mbf and with the collapse of the housing market and the onset of the Great Recession, prices bottomed in FY2009: \$171/mbf. A continued recovery in U.S. housing markets, along with recovery in demand from China, has led to an increase in stumpage values for FY 13: \$333/mbf. Focusing on last year, volume remaining under contract has increased slightly from 547/mmbf in FY12 to 576 in FY13.

For planning efforts, Mr. Blum spoke about the Olympic Experimental State Forest HCP planning unit, OESF research & monitoring strategy, marbled murrelet conservation strategy, and the 2014 sustainable harvest calculation. He then spoke of RMAPS, and DNR's obligation to complete all RMAP work by October 2016. During the 13-15 legislative session the Forest Road program received \$5 million in capital money for RMAP projects. This money, along with a planned increase in the ARRF fee, will help insure we meet the deadline.

 Chair Goldmark added that other industrial landowners have requested a 5-year extension, while the state is continuing its commitment to meet the October 2016 date.

Commissioner Grose stated that it is a little disconcerting having to jump through many hoops with DFW to fulfill commitments set forth by DFW, often times costing a huge expense.

Mr. Blum closed the presentation with revenue gained by our leasing program and highlights of noteworthy land transactions, stating that the biggest transaction in the state's history is not referenced on the slide, but will be presented at next year's annual review for FY14.

PUBLIC COMMENTS FOR GENERAL ITEMS OF INTEREST

Miguel Perez-Gibson, Washington Environmental Council, stated that the council received photos and information from public citizens through the Olympic Forest Coalition that documents a DNR timber sale in what appears to be old growth forest stands and old forest structure. Mr. Perez-Gibson asked that the board review habitat identification procedures and how actual requirements of the HCP for spotted owl habitat are being met, and to review the actual field practices of the old growth policy.

Marcy J. Golde, Olympic Forest Coalition Board Member, presented the board with photos of what was identified as old growth, requesting that the harvest of Stumpy's Ride, possibly containing old growth stand and certainly old growth trees, be halted immediately to protect the remaining trees.
