Roll was taken. Chair welcomed members and guests. Review and approved 13 agenda and last meetings minutes. 14 Minutes Approved: Motion to approve agenda. Kirsten Lints moved and John Bornsworth seconded 15 motion. Unanimous approval. Motion to approve minutes from June 1st, 2021. Lisa Cieko moved and John Bornsworth seconded motion. Unanimous approval. 16 17 **Q&A for program update:** Ben spoke about the reorganization within the DNR in regards to HB 1168 18 (See WCFC Program Update 9.8.21 for more detail). In this reorganization, the Forest Health and 19 Resiliency Division (which houses UCF) is renamed the Forest Resiliency Division and will be more closely 20 aligned with the newly renamed Forest Regulation Division (formerly the Forest Practices Division). State 21 Forester George Geissler had previously been the Deputy Supervisor over the Wildfire and Forest Health 22 Divisions. In this reorganization, George will now be dedicated to Wildfire, while the Forest Resiliency 23 and Forest Regulation Divisions will be overseen by a newly appointed interim Deputy, Alex Smith. 24 George will still retain a connection to UCF and other similar programs receiving federal funding from 25 the USDA Forest Service. 26 Ben introduced Jess Lloyd, the new Urban Forestry Specialist for the DNR UFC Program. Daria has been 27 working successfully on the 2021 Urban and Community Forestry Seminar Series. Ben touched on the 28 programs grants and contracts, as well as the Pest Readiness Project. He also highlighted the technical 29 assistance the UCF program continues to deliver, even through the current pandemic. 30 31 Committee report-outs and equity discussion: The equity committee has been focused on the Articles 32 of Association under the lens of equity. The council focused on finding areas that would allow 33 recruitment from a broader pool of applicants which could increase the ability to achieve more diversity 34 and equity on the council. A nominations committee is working in parallel to focus on recruiting new 35 members and to develop a process for the criteria and selection of candidates. The committee, with

- 1 Ben's assistance, are working to draft new Articles of Association to introduce more flexibility in the
- 2 name of equity. A joint subcommittee meeting was held on 9/7/2021. Kathleen spoke about how to
- 3 expand the outreach of nominations to reach a more diverse population of people, an interest in finding
- 4 equity guidance documents. Semra added that HealthierHere has an equity guideline that is healthcare
- 5 focused but could be a good starting point. Lisa mentioned that there is an opportunity to update the
- 6 Articles, but also to create another document that could capture cultural commitments that the council
- 7 would adopt that the Articles could reference to further anchor equity guidelines. Additional examples
- 8 for documents to reference were provided throughout the chat.

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- Briefing on E2SHB 1216: The Evergreen Communities Act: Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill 1216.
- 11 The funding has been disbursed by the State Office of Financial Management and the internal charge
- 12 codes to begin billing time, activities, and supplies have been established. Ben highlighted that they are
- in the process of stitching together an implementation plan while concurrently executing some early
- activities associated with the bill. This includes ordering equipment, revising the 2022 grant documents
- and schedule to accommodate new obligations of 1216, and drafting position descriptions for new staff
- positions (a tree inventory specialist, a tree inventory technician, and a coordinator for the yet-to-be
- 17 developed Evergreen Communities recognition program).
- 18 Terra Rentz gave a big kudos to the WCFC for all the work the council did in assisting drafting the bill and
- 19 helping it get passed. The council is being held as the ideal model for an advisory council for the DNR.
- 20 Kathy Wolf expressed that the council is ready and enthusiastic to be a sounding board for HB 1216, and
- 21 for the greater agency, and encouraged Terra and leadership to tap the Council for support. Terra
- 22 expressed that the council's perspective could be helpful in expanding on larger Division goals by
- 23 providing their lens to the Forest Resiliency team on how they approach climate change, restoration,
- and equity and inclusion. DNR wants to bring more questions and opportunities for engagement to this
- council while the Division is redefining what "Forest Resiliency" means in the new re-org.

5 Minute Break for council

- Forest conservation and tree planting initiative: Csenka Favorini-Csorba (DNR Senior Policy Advisor)
- 28 Csenka spoke about the agencies restoration goals that stem from the strategic plan. She is a leader on
- 29 the 1 by 1 by 1 Initiative which refers to 3 related goals: 1 million acres restored, 1 million acres
- 30 conserved, 1 million acres planted. Two of the goals are in recognition of that forests are being lost due
- 31 to wildfire and development and the need to be proactive about reforestation. The other goal is related
- 32 to forest conservation and protecting forests that have different values. The goal concerning tree
- 33 planting and active reforestation will be both in natural forests and urban communities. The target for
- 34 this is 1 million acres planted, some of which will be in urban areas. It was discussed that acreage is a
- 35 more meaningful measurement in tree planting on the landscape. Csenka will be looking to the council
- in the future to help with determining prioritization of where trees should go and how to quantify the
- 37 benefits and maintenance needs going into the future—involving the council in this strategy will be top
- 38 of mind.

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- 39 Kathy commented that DNR adapt the language of "value of forests" to an urban context and change
- 40 the language to talk about trees in the ways that they have a direct impact on people's lives. The
- 41 language could include values forests provide such as stormwater management, ecosystem services, and

- 1 many other areas that have been recently heavily researched. Impact health assessments and their
- 2 metrics may also be important to evaluate. She emphasized the importance of connecting the resource
- 3 (and metrics) to the community.
- 4 Lisa mentioned urban natural areas and the potential for management which would provide more value.
- 5 Kathy also mentioned a technical report could be created using Forest Land Assessment Tool (FLAT), to
- 6 gauge the general character and quality of areas and identify areas that could use a more detailed forest
- 7 management plan. Kathy stated that King County uses a similar process for their forest reserves.
- 8 Semra seconded the idea that with increasing urbanization and development there is less canopy
- 9 coverage and there should be a focus on the preservation of canopy cover.. One way to alleviate this is
- by using tree canopy coverage codes. When developing land, the developer must bring canopy coverage
- 11 up to code. This is an example of where policies concerning retaining canopy cover can make a
- difference. Semra sees this as a critical area to look into for implementation. Semra also mentioned that
- 13 Municipal Research and Services Center (MRSC) has some language around trees and urban forestry,
- and it would be interesting to look into how this aligns with the DNR's goal and if a partnership could
- 15 form. Ian expanded on what MRSC does, and that it can at times act as a contracting platform.
- 16 A discussion on climate adapted species and ensuring that the trees planted in urban areas are
- appropriate followed. Cindy mentioned that the state has had extreme drought and heat waves and the
- 18 Department of Ecology encouraged homeowners to let their lawns go dormant, and expressed concern
- 19 about trees that may receive water from lawns. Margaret added that the average citizen does not have
- any knowledge or experience with taking care of trees and suggested that the average urban
- 21 homeowner needs additional educational resources to support planting efforts. Kathy mentioned the
- appeal of forest bathing and that it could help bridge the gap and bring people together for engagement
- and stewardship around trees.
- 24 John raised the concern that private forestry consultations are expensive and inaccessible to many
- 25 people, but some provide their services to non-profits. Semra mentioned the need for voucher
- 26 programs and citizens face the decision of removing trees because of costs. Even with city foresters and
- 27 arborists, consultations, education, maintenance of trees is time sensitive work, not all cities are capable
- of bridging that gap or providing support to tree community outreach "boots on the ground"—lack of
- resources or staffing vary across the state.
- 30 A comment was about effective engagement and communications strategies, and telling stories in ways
- 31 that people will embrace and take ownership over stewardship activities.
- 32 Csenka asked a question about metrics to use for reaching one of the goals in regards to number of
- trees vs. acreage. Members commented that canopy coverage is typically used to determine success in
- urban areas. Kathy was mentioned the i-tree tool from USFS and the 3-30-300 rule 3 trees within view,
- 35 30% canopy cover, green space within 300 meters of their home (or 10 minute walk). Trust for Public
- 36 Land is promoting every person to have a greenspace within a 10 minute walk from their home which
- can be better metric for people and place rather than the tree itself.

- 1 Ben added that urban foresters have translated traditional forestry metrics onto the urban landscape
- and lens, however he believes that in the urban landscape trees have a greater net value—as in, it
- 3 means significantly more to lose one individual tree in an urban area than in a forested area. Even if
- 4 canopy cover could be converted to acres it would be difficult to stack that on top of traditional forest
- 5 metrics because of development pressures and the private-public ownership of land in an urban area
- 6 which creates a more limited ability to plant across the landscape. The translation is possible, but it will
- 7 mean something different in the urban landscape. A conversation on urban forest rating methodology
- 8 ensued, including an example from John on the Amherst.
- 9 Semra added that quantity can be an odd metric because small sized trees have obviously less impact
- than a large tree like a douglas fir. Csenka thanked council for conversation and input, adding that this is
- the early days of the initiative planning and that she will return for updates.

12 Break for council (lunch)

- 13 WCFC recruitments: Ben commented on the desire to be further along with the nominations process
- 14 but would continue to make incremental steps and move forward as there are council positions are
- currently open and some are soon to be open.
- 16 Ben reviewed the open vacancies, which include: 1) Dept of Transportation seat, 2) Public or Private
- 17 land development, urban planner, etc. seat 3) Washington State University Extension, 4) Washington
- 18 State Department of Transportation 5) Non-Profit/Volunteer or Environmental Youth Conservation, 6)
- 19 Washington Association of Landscape Professionals (WALP) 7) Forest Service representative, 8)
- 20 University of Washington seat. Ben would like to advertise a number of these openings in the
- 21 September Tree Link to start the selection process to hopefully fill those positions by the February WCFC
- 22 meeting.
- 23 Kathy mentioned that the University of Washington seat could be altered to a general Higher Education
- 24 seat for inclusivity of other institutions which are doing research and other great work. Ben also
- 25 mentioned that the seat held by Gary Stamper for the Washington State Association of Counties (WSAC)
- could be generally dismissed due to recent absences, and reappointed.
- 27 Semra cited that changes to nominations and roles cannot be changed until the annual meeting, which
- 28 will next be held in February 2022, per the Articles of Association. Semra asked the council to consider
- 29 how they themselves were recruited. Members presented their stories in a roundtable fashion, which
- 30 included recruitment announcements in newsletters, direct conversations with UCF Program Manager,
- 31 meetings and conversations with affiliated folks at conferences and existing work groups, attending the
- 32 council as a guest, self-selection through finding the council themselves, nominated by past members,
- and attending presentations where the opportunity was mentioned.
- 34 There was additional discussion on ways to create a broader recruitment pool. Ben commented that one
- 35 way to recruit from a broader pool would be to expand the roles to broader categories over specific
- 36 institutions. Lisa mentioned that they could do a general recruitment rather than for specific positions
- 37 since some people may not see exactly where they fit in specific categories. Ben mentioned possibility of
- 38 including list of basic qualifications. Lisa thought they should encourage young, early career, and people
- 39 not traditionally included in urban forestry to apply or ask about the positions.

12	Juli spoke about climate adaption, supply and demand, and the lack of availability of species that will
13	work well with climate change. Competition between projects or agencies or counties creates a
14	limitation on availability of plants and cost could be prohibitive without more supply. Suggested to start
15	making the shift sooner before costs rise due to lack of plant availability. Lisa mentioned the NNRG
16	group to connect with other land managers on adaptation strategies:
