Outdoor Access and Responsible Recreation (OARR) Planning Process and Feedback

Recreation on Lands Managed by DNR

3 million acres of uplands (including forest, agriculture, grazing, and urban lands).

The Natural Area Preserve (NAP) system includes more than **41,000 acres in 58 sites.** DNR manages

5.6 million acres

of state-owned upland and aquatic lands to sustainably achieve multiple values.

More than **2.6 million** acres of state-owned aquatic lands (SOAL).

The Natural Resource Conservation Areas (NRCAs) protect native ecosystems, habitat, and scenic landscapes. Nearly **126,000 acres** *are conserved in 39 sites.*

Nationwide Trends in Recreation

53%

of Americans participated in outdoor recreation at least once in 2020.

An additional **7.1 million people** in 2020 versus 2019.

of new recreationists said they did not want to continue their new activities.



Nearly 3/4 of recreation participants

were white.

Over the last 3 years, participation rates have **declined 7%** among Asian Americans

and **remained stagnant** for Black participants.

Tribal Rights and Interests

- The US Federal and Washington State Governments recognize tribes as sovereign nations, having specific rights.
- Outdoor recreation impacts on ecosystems in areas covered by historic treaties can limit tribes' ability to exercise their sovereign and inherent rights through the harming or destruction of natural and cultural resources¹.
- As outdoor recreation participation increases, so can the potential to further impact Tribal rights²



DNR Recreation Planning Hierarchy

Strategic

Statewide Outdoor Access and Recreation Plan DNR has no strategic plan for recreation

Landscape

Landscape Recreation Plans

Outline recreation needs for a landscape with strategies of how to achieve its vision. *Ex. Baker to Bellingham Recreation Plan* DNR has 10 landscape plans

Operational

Planning for, designing, and implementing recreation opportunities to meet specific needs of users in a given area within the context of the Regional Recreation Plan.

Facility and Infrastructure Planning

Ex. Olsen Creek Trail System

~100 projects per biennium

OARR Draft Goals

To develop a shared vision for recreation and public access on DNR-managed lands, that provides diverse and high quality recreational opportunities that foster engagement from all communities, promote a strong sense of environmental stewardship and enriches the quality of life in Washington.

A key part of this work will be to articulate what responsible and sustainable use of DNR-managed lands for generations looks like, in order to ensure that all outdoor users are taught and practice preservation and responsible use.

Phase 1: DNR Small Group (Completed)

In 2021, DNR convened a small group with membership drawn from users representing different types of WA outdoor recreation, land owners, and the recreation industry.

They developed five key topics areas for the plan to focus on:

- Preserve and Protect Natural and Cultural Resources
- Increase Equitable Outdoor Access and Recreation, Education and Engagement
- Manage Effectively and Fund Sustainably
- Mitigate Climate Impacts and Build Resilience
- Experience the Joy of the Outdoors

This work provided a critical foundation on which to begin Phase 2.



In Phase 3, DNR will write and publish the OARR Plan

This phase will consist of:

- Writing a Draft OARR Plan
- Sharing that Draft OARR Plan with the Tribes for review and approval
- Soliciting public feedback on the Draft OARR Plan
- Updating the plan to incorporate Tribal and public feedback

Publishing the Final OARR Plan

Draft Goals of the Outdoor Access and Recreation Plan

- Preserve and Protect the Natural Environment and Cultural Resources
- Build an Outdoor Stewardship and Responsibility Ethic
- Increase Equitable Outdoor Access and Responsible Recreation Development, Stewardship, and Management
- Secure Financial Stability for Recreation Development, Stewardship, and Management
- Mitigate Climate Impacts and Build Resilience
