The Trojan War Digout #2 is a fill removal project involving the decommission of a perennial non-fish stream crossing. The site involves steep fill slopes with steep sidecast slopes on the approaches. The site drains to the southeast into an unnamed tributary to the river. The road crosses moderate to steep (>60%) slopes at the site with steep (>60%) cutslopes and fillslopes on the approaches. Decommission will return the stream to its original configuration and reduce the potential for plugged culverts, fill failures, and associated erosion at this site in the future.

FPA# 2938210 indicates 1100 feet of road abandonment, one stream crossing and 500 cubic yards of spoils. -JCT

Soils at the site are mapped as very gravelly loams of the Schneider Series. The soils are classified as GM soils using the Unified Soil Classification System. The soils are well-drained.

The WDNR landslide inventory does not identify any slides at the site.

- FPA #2938210 indicates 500 cubic yards of spoils will be generated. -JCT

- Removing the culvert
- Digging out the fill down to original stream grade
- Laying back the approaches at a 2:1 slope
- Pulling back sidecast on the approaches
- Waste will be end-hauled to a stable location
- Only cutting trees in the leave area below the road as necessary to conduct the project safely.

Yes. Exposed soils from road construction have potential for erosion. Use of road by vehicles can generate sediment.

Standard erosion control BMPs will be used. Covering exposed soil with straw, constructing sumps, adding cross-drains, straw bails to slow and filter water in the ditch, and silt fences, etc.
