occur and that this would be on-going.

15 PUBLIC COMMENT ON PETITION FOR RULE MAKING ON AERIAL CHEMICAL SPRAYING

- 18 Mark Smith requested the Board to review the rules related to the use of herbicide spray.
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- Bruce Barnes provided photos of elk with hoof rot disease and deformed antlers. He urged the Board
 to take a serious look at the rules and how the chemicals are being used and mixed.
- Jon Gosch shared his perspective on how pesticides affect humans, elk and the soil. He encouraged a review of the use of pesticides.

- 26 Heather Hansen, Washington Friends of Farms and Forests, stated that all pesticides are regulated by
- the Environmental Protection Agency and the Department of Agriculture. She said that herbicides arenon-toxic to mammals and designed to work on metabolic pathways to plants.

- 30 Karen Terwilleger, Washignton Forests Protection Association, stated that they support the current
- regulatory process and the studies conducted by Department of Fish and Wildlife to understand the
- 32 origin and treatment of Elk hoof rot disease.

- 34 PETITION FOR RULE MAKING ON AERIAL CHEMICAL SPRAYING
- 35 The Board considered the petition for rule making to amend rules to eliminate certain chemical use
- 36 and reduce the impacts of use to the health of humans, fish and wildlife by receiving the following
- 37 presentations.
- 38
- 39 Marc Ratcliff, DNR, provided an overview on forest practice rules governing chemical spraying.
- 40 Information included the purpose of the forest practices rules is to regulate the handling, storage, and
- 41 application of chemicals in a manner that the public health, lands, fish, wildlife, aquatic habitat,
- 42 wetland and riparian management zone vegetation will not be significantly damaged, and water
- 43 quality will not be endangered by contamination. He mentioned that DNR does not oversee the
- 44 regulations imposed on a specific pesticide product or the determination to remove such a product
- 45 from general use. He also stated that WAC 222-38-020(7) states pesticides shall only be applied in46 accordance with:
- Limitations printed on the federal EPA container registration label, and/or established by
 regulation of the Washington Department of Agriculture;

1 2 3	• Limitations established by the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration, or the state Department of Labor and Industries, as they relate to the safety and health of operators and the public; and		
3 4 5	 DNR or the state Department of Agriculture may suspend further use of any equipment responsible for chemical leakage until corrected.

7	Robin Schoen-Nessa, Department of Agriculture, provided an overview on its rules governing the use		
8 9	of pesticide which includes that they are the lead agency that administers the law and rules related to pesticides. She said they regulate all uses, applications, distributions, labels and any misuses of		
10	pesticides. She also highlighted the management process and common household products that are considered pesticides.

12 13	Kristin Mansfi	ield, Department of Fish and Wildlife, presented information on hoof rot disease known	
14	as "Wild Ungulate Hoof Disease", specifically research that was conducted in recent years. She		
15 16	concluded that the research indicated that there is no significant underlying musculoskeletal or systemic disease and the disease is limited to the hooves.
