Proposal Summary: This proposal commemorates R. B. (Richard Benjamin) Meyer, who purchased a 49 acre parcel in 1928 with the intention of establishing a dairy farm. The stream flows along the east side of his property, and crossed the southern end.

Mr. Meyer was born in Colby, WI in 1885. In Wisconsin, Mr. Meyer established a successful dairy and cheese factory, before Kraft Foods made him an offer for his business in the mid 1920's. After selling, Mr. Meyer moved to Rosedale to start another dairy and cheese business. Mr. Meyer did sell the milk to the Kitsap Dairy, but never started the cheese business here in WA.

Mr. Meyer's son built a fish pond on the southern end of the property, and in the 1990's, a salmon egg incubator was set up. A run of Chum Salmon now uses the creek, and the proponent still tends to the fish incubator.

According to the proponent, some county maps have the feature named as "Rosedale Creek", but the feature does not have an official name.

Proposal Summary: This proposal is for an un-named cove located in Thurston County. The point that forms the east edge of the cove is named Dickenson Point, and the proponent states that the cove was known as "Dickenson Cove" by local residents.

Thomas Dickenson was a carpenter's mate on the 1841 U.S. Exploring Expedition and Dickenson Point is named for him. Native Americans historically camped in the cove and arrowheads have been found there. Dickenson Point was called "Blc-sáxwab" or "where they jump" by Native Americans.

A present resident, Skip Pape, who grew up in the cove and still lives there recalls using the name "Dickenson Cove" for this feature.

The City of Lacey felt that there would be confusion because there was a Long Lake Park to the south, so the City denied the request. The City made a verbal commitment to Mr. Long to honor the Long family within the park.

During the master planning process (1991-1994), the City started using the name "Long's Pond" on their maps and documentation. The feature has also been identified as "Fleetwood Lake/Pond" and "Goose Pond" on various maps. The feature is officially not named.
