
Revised Draft EIS | Public Comment

Revised Draft EIS released September 7, 2018

4 Public Meetings were held:

- Cathlamet

- Seattle
- Burlington



60-day comment period + 30-day extension

> Ended December 6, 2018

DNR submitted to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) the Proposed Amendment to the 1997 State Trust Lands Habitat Conservation Plan (1997 HCP)

The Proposed Amendment represented DNR's preferred alternative (Alternative H) for the marbled murrelet long-term conservation strategy



DNR and USFWS invited the public to review and provide comments on both the Revised Draft EIS and the Proposed Amendment













Two additional documents were released during the RDEIS public comment period:

- Financial Analysis, October 2018
- Losses and Gains Analysis (draft),
 October 2018

A 30-day comment period was offered for both documents

Major Themes

- Support for Alternative B
- Support for Alternatives F and/or G
- Support for H
- Support for previously submitted Conservation Alternative
- Concern that none of the alternatives do enough to protect marbled murrelet populations
- Concern for economic impacts



Common Concerns

- Socioeconomic impacts especially on county services and Jr. Taxing Districts
- Net loss of 1,000 acres in the North Puget strategic location under Alt. H
- Concern over the general decline in the marbled murrelet population
- Not enough mitigation in any of the alternatives to account for habitat loss due to climate change and natural and human disturbance
- There needs to be more effort to develop alternative sources of funding for beneficiaries besides timber harvest – the forests are imperative for the marbled murrelet
- Habitat model misses habitat; captures non-functional habitat



Common Concerns

- Broader geographic distribution; larger and more connected habitat is needed for the marbled murrelet to recover
- All older forest and old-growth needs to be protected
- The final long-term conservation strategy needs to meet recovery goals
- Concerns about including non-habitat in Special Habitat Areas
- Emphasizing the importance of revenue for beneficiaries
- Concerns about assumptions for habitat development
- Need for better protection of occupied sites and buffers from human disturbance
